Reflections

Reflections from a Mount Old Scholar

Reflections: Victoria Brown

Victoria (2014 - 16) is Global Operations Graduate Associate at AstraZeneca. She was awarded a first class BSc Chemistry (with a year in industry).

What is the first thing that comes to mind when you think back to your years at The Mount?

I came to The Mount for College from a large state school just outside of York. At first the environment at The Mount was completely alien to me. An all-girls Quaker school couldn't have been further from what I was used to, but I loved it. It was a strange adjustment at first, especially the terminology, "Morning Meeting" instead of "assembly" and "Choc Lunch" instead of "break", but what amazed me the most was how quickly it started to feel like home.



What is your fondest memory of The Mount?

My fondest memory of The Mount has to be the College I Pantomime. Other than Games in the Dark, this was my first major exposure to wacky Mountie traditions and I couldn't believe we were actually given free creative direction to put together a Christmas panto for the whole school.

Our Year's pantomime was based around the Woman-in-Black stealing Cinderella's shoe and all kinds of fictional characters helping to get it back. Maddie and I did a dance half way through to *Classic* by MKTO and we still remember the steps to this day. Funnily enough, my career in the theatre started and ended with the College I panto, but it is something I will probably fondly tell my grandkids about some day.

How important an influence has the Quaker ethos been to you?

I think the Quaker ethos has been more influential in my life than I'd realised. It has helped me always to see the best in people which, as I have started to move into management roles, has allowed me to approach my team with compassion and empathy and offer support wherever I can.

It has also taught me to be reflective which has been so useful to me as I've started my career, instead of charging into a problem I instead take a step back and reflect on my options before forming opinions or coming to conclusions.

Finally I think in some of twist of fate it has drawn me to a company that shares very similar values, a company that puts its patients first, a company that makes sure very single one of its employees feels valued.

Through your years at university, did you feel conscious of any influences from your time at The Mount that helped you through your studies?

This question made me smile whilst reading it as one very particular teacher comes to mind, and anyone who has had the pleasure of A-Level Chemistry with Mrs Perks will know exactly what I'm referring too.

As I said, I came to The Mount for College and, with being a little nervous at first, sat right in the back corner of Mrs Perks' classroom and tried to stay quiet and out of the way. This of course doesn't work so well when you have a class of seven people.

So the first lesson we had we been told to forget everything we learnt at GCSEs as A-Level Chemistry was entirely more complex than that, which sent me into quite a tailspin. I went on to spend almost a year and half of my Chemistry A-Level in what can only be described as a confused, overwhelming panic, and the one thing I remember so vividly was that, at the end of each lesson Mrs Perks would tell us to simply, "Let it sit". At the time this seemed like crazy advice as the final exams were fast approaching and I still had no idea what was going on.

However, she was right and it is advice that has stayed with me ever since. Eventually it did start to filter in and make sense. It is something I applied all the way through university and in my career. If I'm ever feeling overwhelmed and something isn't making sense I get up for a while, walk away and, "Just let it sit". 9 times out of 10, I come back to the problem with a much clearer mind and a forward path.

Describe a moment in your career thus far which you feel was connected to your Mount education?

I think the time that has most reflected on my Mount education is the last 8 months I have spent as a member of the AstraZeneca vaccine supply team. During this time, the team at AZ have supplied 2.5 billion doses of vaccine to mainly low and middle income countries. This of course did not come without its challenges. Being part of the supply team was an incredibly intense and fast paced environment.

To succeed and deliver supply to patients, I needed to ensure I was resilient and focused on the end goal of doing the right thing, which are two characteristics I developed at The Mount.



Looking ahead, what are your hopes for the future?

My hopes for the future are that, through my work in the pharmaceutical industry I can really make a difference. I want to be able to advocate for equitable healthcare and be a driver in removing the barriers to healthcare that we see today. I would like to remain part of an organisation that holds itself accountable for doing the right thing and continues to uphold their ability to make a real difference to people's lives.

In addition to this I would also like to go on to be a great leader within my organisation. I have had the fortune of being exposed to some incredibly strong and talented women who have been kind enough to mentor me and I want to be able to pay that forward someday.



Broadwood Square Piano

In-Person Old Scholars' Visits

The Senior School was delighted to welcome back Charlotte Bina (2012 – 17) and Jacqueline Smale (2010 – 17) at the end of March for the first in-person Old Scholar visit since before lockdown. Other Old Scholars have visited since the pandemic to give a talk, but this was the first visit to include a guided tour, chats with former teachers and current pupils.

Charlotte is currently completing her Law degree at the University of Bayreuth in Germany and Jacqui is the Local Government Association's National Graduate Management Trainee having graduated from the University of Sheffield with a 2:1 BA in International Relations.

They spent the day speaking with their former teachers and current pupils, some of whom remembered them well. Meeting with College during Form Time, the Old Scholars shared their advice about UCAS, life at university and making the most of the time they have at The Mount.





Catching up with former teachers Wendy Thompson (who was Head of College and Careers when Charlotte and Jacqui were in Sixth Form), Head of Humanities Carol Cook, Head of Maths Tony McAleese and Deputy Head Bridget Perks (formerly Head of Chemistry) was a delight. They traded stories with light banter and laughter, reminiscing about those days. "It was so lovely to catch up with them both," smiled Wendy Thompson.

Throughout the day, both women reflected on memories of their time here, and how the School influenced their lives.

"I took a lot from The Mount. I turned into a very disciplined person. I got into a habit of doing my work every day, then it's more bearable. Sixth Form is a rollercoaster for everyone. But it will be fine in the end. Try and look back and say to yourself I've done the best I can, and if it doesn't turn out perfectly, then that's fine because you've tried your best and you have nothing to regret," Charlotte advised College pupils.

"Enjoy College for what it is, because it is such a good time. The Mount gives you a lot of support. When I got to uni I realised how much support we have had here compared to others," said Jacqui.

They were encouraged in their meeting with David Griffiths that his stewardship of the school provides girls with exceptional opportunities to enrich their educational experience during their time here. "The Mount is superb for young women," he said. "Talking to Jacqui and Charlotte, you can see in their faces the appreciation and love they have for The Mount and their time here. A Mount education makes an enormous difference. Their genuine desire to give back today, by sharing their lived experiences has inspired our College students as they prepare for their final A-Levels and our GCSE students as well. We encourage positive role models here within the school and that ethos continues far beyond the School years. Mount education is truly an education for life."



Audrey's Children

A film is currently being produced to celebrate the life of Mount Old Scholar and leading paediatric oncologist and philanthropist Dr Audrey Evans (1938 - 41). Her time at The Mount was cut short due to illness with tuberculosis after the war, but she nevertheless trained at the Royal College of Surgeons in Edinburgh and the Royal Infirmary, completing her degree in 1953. She received the Fulbright Fellowship at Boston Children's Hospital and finished her medical training at Johns Hopkins. Audrey is known as the 'Mother of Neuroblastoma' because of all the advances, research and work she pioneered for this type of cancer in which she was able to reduce by 50% the mortality rate caused by neuroblastoma. She co-founded the Ronald McDonald House Charities which support families of children being treated for cancer, and established St James School in West Philadelphia, which helps underprivileged children by providing them, tuition-free, an extra year of school guided by Audrey's vision of 'total care'.



"I still have the ability to do something for the benefit of humanity," she says. "I've always had a strong belief in an inner God who watches over us and takes care of us and has expectations of us to do a good job with the life He gave us. ... I had been fortunate in that I had a very good, very extravagant education, and I know what education does for you. These kids need help too," she said of the founding of St James School.

When asked how she would wish to be remembered, she answers, "Audrey Evans, a woman who cared."

Olivia's Images


Photographer Olivia Brabbs (1988 – 93) loved seeing one of her images featured in the Sunday Telegraph's review of The Vices York.

Lyndsey In Our Time

Lyndsey Coo (1997 – 2003) PhD joined the panel on BBC Radio 4's In Our Time, discussing Sophocles' tragedy of dilemmas, where King Creon threatens death to anyone who unburies a traitor and a traitor's sister, Antigone, defies him. At one point, Melvyn Bragg asks Lyndsey about Antigone and Creon using similar words for different meanings.



"We can see in that exchange between the two of them (Antigone and Creon), that they are using the same terms but completely different systems behind them. Which means they are using the same words but they don't actually communicate, they talk past each other," she explains during the programme. Foundation Office

The Foundation officer and the person responsible for MOSA is Vanessa Charters, formerly the school's Director of Marketing. Vanessa, who has been at The Mount since 2012, worked in the marketing industry for her entire career, which includes posts in London, Australia, Hong Kong (where she was Nike's Category Sports Marketing Manager for Asia Pacific and Africa) and her native Fiji. She has a BA from the University of Queensland and an MBA from the University of Hong Kong. In addition to her work at The Mount, she is an advisor for the UK-based Fijian community and also the Centre for Applied Human Rights at the University of York. She and her husband have four children, the youngest two of whom are currently at The Mount in Year 11 and College I. Vanessa is passionate about the benefits of an all-girls education.

I grew up in Brisbane, Australia, and attended a state school (Brisbane State High School) which in this country would have been called a selective grammar school. (Grammar schools in Australia are generally in the independent sector.) It was humungous; there were 364 pupils in my year alone (our Maths teacher liked to point out that we were just shy of one for each day of the year). The way the school achieved the best academic results was through teaching and learning in single-sex classes. In our GCSE-equivalent years (Junior Certificate), we only had co-ed classes for elective subjects. In our Sixth Form equivalent (Senior Certificate), the brighter kids were in mixed classes for core subjects; all other core lessons were to single-sex classes.

At university, I noticed that you could always 'tell' which women came from all-girl schools because they carried a freedom of spirit, a certain grace, that those of us from co-ed schools lacked. The closest way I can think to describe them is that they were unsquashed. When my daughters were born, I wanted that same freedom for then. My husband and I moved from Fiji to a rural area near Malton, and when we started looking around for senior schools, we were delighted to discover The Mount and learn about its Quaker

ethos. The past ten years marketing the school has been an enormous privilege. Good marketing tells compelling stories; The Mount is teeming with amazing stories every single day. The team is thankful that David Griffiths encourages those stories to be shared beyond our school community.

Shortly after I was appointed to The Mount Foundation, I was very grateful to sit down with Christine Johnson (1949 - 54) who gave generously of her time to share with me her insights on MOSA, its history and the recent changes when association was absorbed into the School. Moving forward, I hope to capture the collaborative spirit that thrived so beautifully under MOSA's branch network structure. Our Mount Mentors are wonderful who make a real difference to pupils' prospects and I am also keen to continue improving the support for those connections.

I have the privilege of enjoying the very active alumni network of my alma mater, as well as those of my husband and our son. Even though I live in a different hemisphere, I fly back to Australia for my school reunions every five years, as do most of my other schoolmates who live abroad; every time we reconnect, the experience is life-affirming and joyous. I look forward to reforging that joy for Mount Old Scholars, not only on Reunion Weekends, but throughout the year both in-person and online.

The Old Scholars' portal will play a key role in facilitating those connections. Planned work for The Mount Foundation is also impressive and I can't wait to see the responses as these begin to roll out, such as fundraising for the girls from Ukraine, mentioned on page 25. These truly are exciting times for the entire Mount community.
